Commercial Silenced Sterling Mk 5 (L34A1)

During WWII Sterling had been involved in the manufacture of the silenced De Lisle Carbine, this was superseded by the silenced STEN Mk 2S and Mk 6S in service during the 1950s and 60s. The major drawback of these silenced STENs was that their silencers were destroyed if fired on full auto. Initial trials in the late 1940s on silencing Sterlings were based on sub sonic ammunition and George Patchett developed a clip on silencer for the MK II Patchett. However this project was shelved in favour of continued research to use standard ammunition. Development continued both at Enfield and Sterling through the 1950s. George Patchett had the idea of drilling six rows of 12 holes along the rifling of the barrel, this allowed gases to escape and reduced the bullet to sub sonic speed by the time it left the muzzle; when assembled with diffusers and baffles this resulted in a silent discharge which could be fired on full auto. The **Sterling-Patchett 9mm Sub Machine Gun Mk 5** was finally introduced in May 1966 and was manufactured solely by Sterling Engineering at Dagenham. Following user trials the Mk 5 Silenced Sterling was introduced into British Military service as the **Gun, Sub Machine, 9mm L34A1** in 1967. Production ceased in 1988 after 3,500 commercial and about 500 military guns had been manufactured.

New Zealand Service

Company records indicate that New Zealand purchased 5 commercial models.

All L34A1s had no Prefix but just a straight number e.g. 278 etc

The L34A1s were in service from the late 70s through to 1989 in a Counter Terrorist role with NZSAS
