AN INTERESTING BAYONET

Pat 1895 Socket Bayonet, why they break by Phil Cregeen

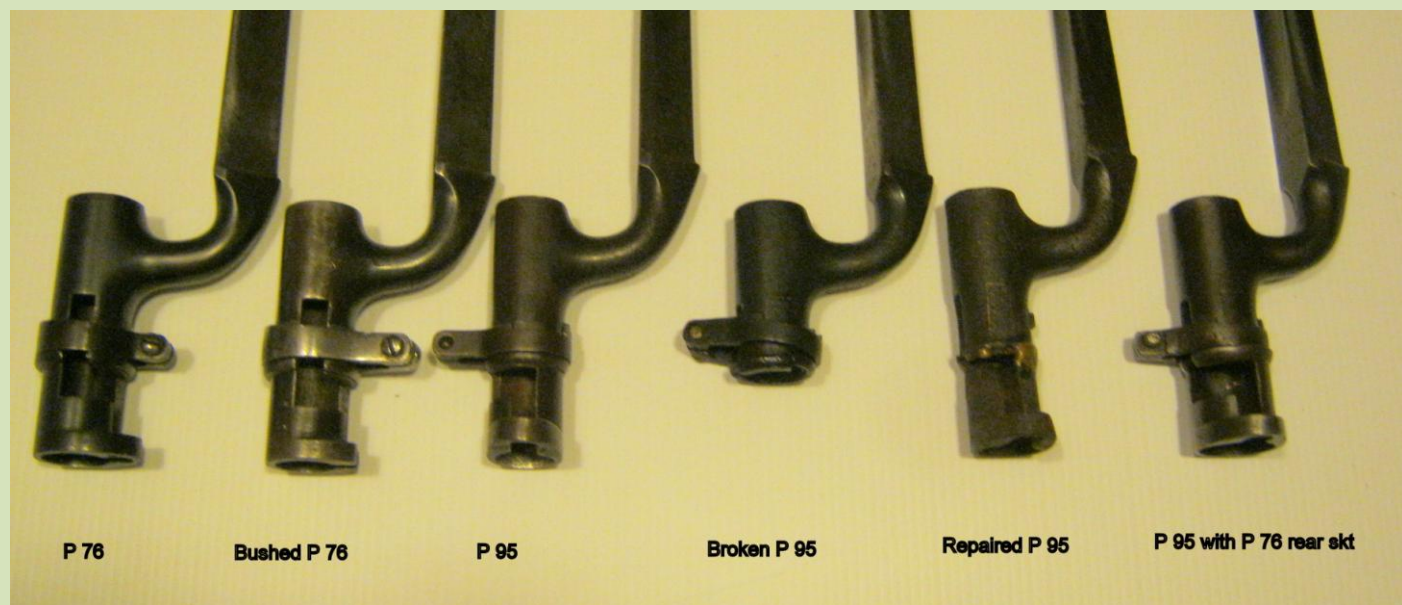
In a previous E Gazette Mk II I speculated that the many short socket Pattern 1895 found in NZ may have been modified to fit the Martini 310 Cadet Rifle, I now find it necessary to review this information in the light of more recent research.

My theory is now that these bayonets are simply broken ones that have been roughly treated, although they do fit on a Martini Cadet. Comment from Noel Taylor: *"The reason you find so many bayonets with broken socket was that they were later issued as candle holders in Bell Tents, the hammering into the ground caused damage to the socket. I have one from one of my father's TF mates he acquired it at his first Annual Camp in 1927 it still had candle grease in the socket and needed a bit of heat to straighten out."*

The Pattern 1895 Socket bayonet for the Martini Enfield .303 rifle was a conversion from the Pattern 1876 Martini Henry bayonet and was introduced in the List of Changes # 8119 on 4 October 1895 which stated "The conversion is made from the bayonet, triangular, Martini Henry, long, and consists generally in cutting down and re-bushing the socket, the socket then being bored and slotted, and fitted with a new locking ring, stop, and screw arranged to fit the rifle. When fixed, the blade is below the barrel instead of at the side, as in the Martini Henry Rifles."

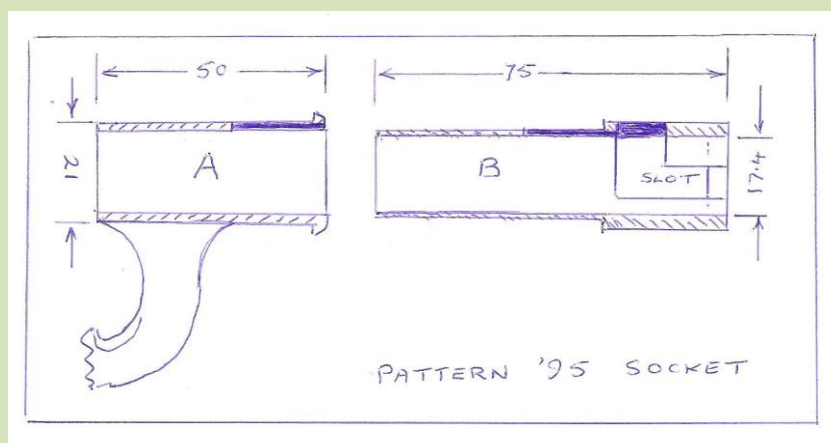


A comparison of Martini sockets

Referring to the above picture note: the P 76 bushed for .303 ME was converted at Citadel Arsenal, Khartoum and not issued in NZ, the two sockets on the right appear to be attempts at repair by an amateur.

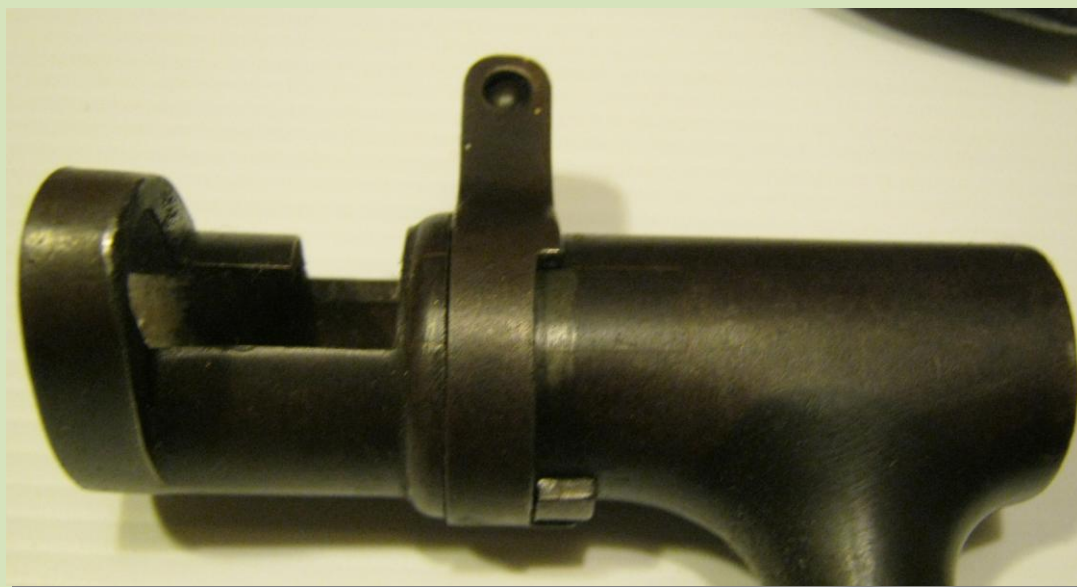
Having studied a number of damaged bayonets it is possible to form an opinion as to how the conversion process was achieved and why they break. Unfortunately no Enfield drawings or procedure has been uncovered, so the following is speculation at this stage.

- Rear part of socket is cut off at the locking ring guide, leaving about 50mm of original socket. OD 22.5 mm (Part A in drawing below)
- Reduce remaining socket diameter by swaging down outside diameter from 22.5mm to 21mm which also reduces the inside bore diameter (we don't know if this was done hot or cold)
- New smaller diameter socket bored to size to receive the bush and rear forging (as per drawing below).
- New rear part of socket hot forged (Part B), centre hole bored under size. OD 21 mm
- Rear forging inserted, being brazed in place and old slot filled. Socket normalised by heat treatment.
- New slot cut and bore opened up to finished size (ID 17.4 mm).
- External socket polished and blued.
- New locking ring fitted. Note the new locking ring has a higher bridge opening to match the one on the insert (B).



RSAF Enfield converted over 86,000 Pat '95 bayonets and to date no record has been found of any new made Pattern '95 bayonets, although it is possible that some were made by the Trade.

Close examination of a Pat '95 in good light will reveal where the old slot has been filled and at the front end of the socket it may be possible to see the bushing. Another indicator of conversion is on the top of the blade where it is possible to see old proof and inspection marks over stamped with new ones.



The filled section of the original slot can be seen in front of the locking ring in line with the new slot.

In 1898 New Zealand purchased 5,000 Martini Enfield Rifles and Pat '95 bayonets, the rifles are marked on the front of the receiver N ^Z 98 and a rack number on the rear of the receiver, the bayonets have a rack number stamped on top of the socket.

Why are so many found broken? When the internal bore is opened up to size to fit on the rifle the forward bush part of B is less than a mm in thickness and is further weakened by the slot, thus it is easy to see why they fail at this point when used as tent pegs or receive similar abuse. All the broken bayonets I have examined show the inner bush to be broken in the region of the step rather than cut off with a hacksaw.

A Native Police Carbine from the Pat Glynn Collection.



This carbine is based on the Pat 1856 Cavalry Carbine, which was a stop gap general issue arm in preference to capping breech loaders like the Calisher & Terry, while a decision was made about the form of the new service breech loading rifle and carbine. The Native Police version has a smooth bore of 0.650" calibre and a fixed block rear sight. In other respects it is identical to the P 56 Cavalry Carbine, also known as the "East India Pattern", with an overall length of 37" and a 20" barrel held in the stock by two bands and a tang screw. It has a captive ram rod and a saddle ring bar held in place by the side nails.



This example was made at Enfield in 1868 and has had the addition of simple wire sling swivels. It is just possible to detect faint proof marks on the barrel, most likely Enfield proof. A brass disc has been inserted in the butt, bearing the legend "EXCISE & SALT D 35". The only reference to EXCISE & SALT that I could find originates in India, so I suspect that this is where this carbine came from.

Kaikohe & District Memorial RSA Inc, L5 105mm Pack Howitzer, contributed by John Osborne

New Zealand purchased 24 L5s in the early 1960s, 5 more later, 6 of which were deployed to South Vietnam from July 1965. Eighty-nine Gunners & about 24 support personnel, who formed 161 Bty RNZA, were attached to the US 173rd Airborne Brigade. 161 Bty RNZA saw its first action with a fire support mission on 19 July 1965. On 8 February 1967 in Vietnam these L5 Howitzers were replaced with US M2A2 105mm Howitzers.

Report to Council 10th March 2012

Since our last annual general meeting the Council has been busy on number of projects.

I would first like to take the time to acknowledge the effort put in over the last year on members' behalf. My thanks to John Bryce, Paul Clark, Stuart Hayman, Gary Birch, Lech Beltowski and Trevor Dyke for their technical support in preparation and delivery on the various submissions. Andre Doyle and Paul Clark for representing New Zealand in the forums they have had access to, to ensure our position was presented and we are aware of international developments. Last, but not least, Dianne Brown for her dedication to the members in the long hours she gives to ensure we are prepared for discussions.

This year has not been without its difficulties as well. Late in 2010 our treasurer, Tobin Bradwell suffered a bleed on the brain; while we stood him down to allow him to recover, his recovery may take longer than expected. We have taken back the work load he had and will seek assistance in getting the accounts up to date before we pass them on to a new treasurer. Please accept my apology if you have not received a membership renewal - we will endeavor to get this out of the next two months.

Throughout the year we have kept the membership informed of our work through the bimonthly COLFO columns in your association newsletters and the *NZ Guns and Hunting* magazine.

We have held a number of meetings in the last year with police, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFaT), members of parliament, and the Law and Order Select Committee Chair and Committee.

We have also attended international meetings with associated groups in Australia and New York and have been in regular communication with these groups and individuals.

We have started a campaign informing members of parliament of developments in firearms legislation to illustrate how effective our current laws are relative to overseas' experiences.

Progress on our strategic plan

We have made good progress on developing communication to members and relationships with policy makers and stakeholders. However, we were not able to attract international firearms groups to New Zealand to hold a meeting.

We have received a brief on the United Nations Arms Trade Treaty which, in the opinion of MFaT, will have little effect on New Zealand directly.

We are still concerned about the indirect or unplanned consequences of this on importing of parts and firearms into New Zealand. We are writing an open letter to the United Nations to make our position clear.

We have begun a campaign to counter a build up in anti-firearm journalism prior to the review of the UN Program of Action due in August this year. This is also to deliver on our planned promotion of New Zealand firearms legislation as the internationally cost effective risk management program.

Internally we are in discussion with police to bring consistency across the districts in the application of firearms law. This will continue to be a considered discussion to improve standards.

We thank you for your feedback and look forward to representing you in the coming year.

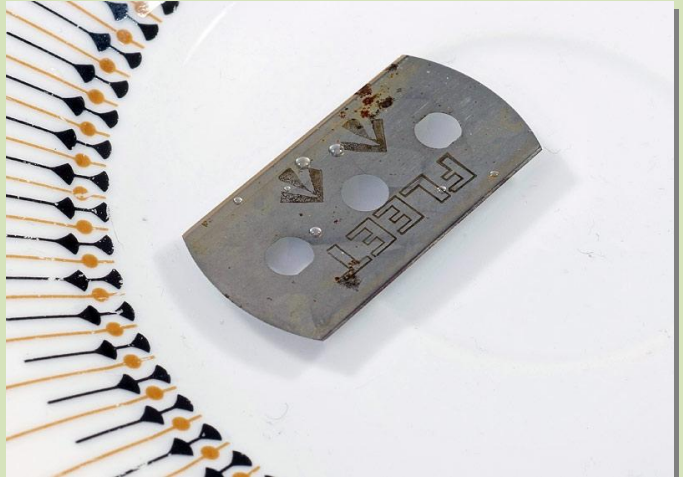

SALUTE 70 Re-living the arrival of US Marines in New Zealand, by Jeff Atkinson Secretary NZMHS

Excitement is mounting ahead of the 70th Anniversary celebrations to commemorate the 'friendly invasion' and 'occupation' of New Zealand by American Armed Forces from 1942 to 1944.

Launching **Salute 70**, a unique 1940's themed festival to commemorate the Anniversary, Kapiti Mayor Jenny Rowan says there's overwhelming support for the celebrations which pay tribute to American servicemen and women who were stationed, trained or convalesced in New Zealand during World War II. Ms Rowan said it was also an opportunity to acknowledge the many thousands of sailors or ships crews who manned the 200 or more naval and support vessels which came here during the war.

"Given the passing of time this is our last big opportunity to host Marines and other U.S. Armed forces, who camped on our land, were adopted by our families, dated our grandmothers, and defended our country while "our men" were fighting in the Middle East. It's a great time for people to find their old photos, their address books, and war-time treasures and be part of a very special anniversary," she says.

Organised by the Kapiti US Marines Trust in cooperation with the Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC), the Kapiti Coast District Council (KCDC) and a range of other heritage, environment and tourism groups, **Salute 70** aims to engage Kiwis and American citizens with connections to this important period of history.

Ms Rowan says the main focus of the **Salute 70** festival is the Wellington Region, particularly in Camps Paekakariki, Russell and Mackay where over 15,000 U.S. military personnel were stationed. (Nearly 8,000 Marines were also stationed in Titahi Bay, Porirua, Plimmerton, Judgeford and Pauatahanui.)

Salute 70 will open in Paekakariki On Saturday, May 26, with an extravaganza of 1940's music. This will lead into a major **Memorial Day** (the U.S. equivalent of Anzac Day) event in Queen Elizabeth Park (the former Camp Russell) on Monday, May 28.

The **Memorial Day** event will feature the New Zealand Air force Band and leading New Zealand baritone Zane Te Wiremu Jarvis. It will be attended by Governor General Lt Gen Rt Hon Sir Jerry Mateparae, tangata whenua, national and local politicians, members of the New Zealand and U.S. armed services, the RSA, visiting U.S. Marines and their families, community and youth groups.

As part of the event, a new memorial to ten US sailors who died off Paekakariki beach in June, 1943, during landing exercises, will be unveiled and new Memorial Grove of Trees to honour the lives of men killed in the Pacific war will be planted.

Salute 70 will run until June 14 (the official anniversary of the Marines landing in Wellington), when a number of Anniversary events and a concert will be held at the Wellington Town Hall.

The U.S. Embassy is expected to bring the U.S. Marines Forces Pacific Band back to New Zealand for the celebrations. The popular band, which was a "star turn" during the Rugby World Cup, will tour a number of major centres, starting with a concert in Kapiti on June 10.

Salute 70 will also features special tours of Marine camp sites in Kapiti and other parts of the Wellington Region, a memorial dinner, a history lecture series, community story-telling sessions and 1940's themed movie evenings.

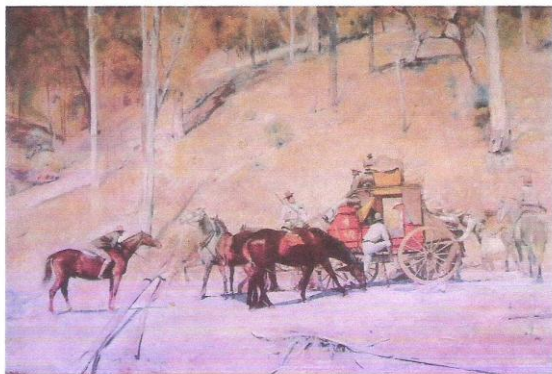

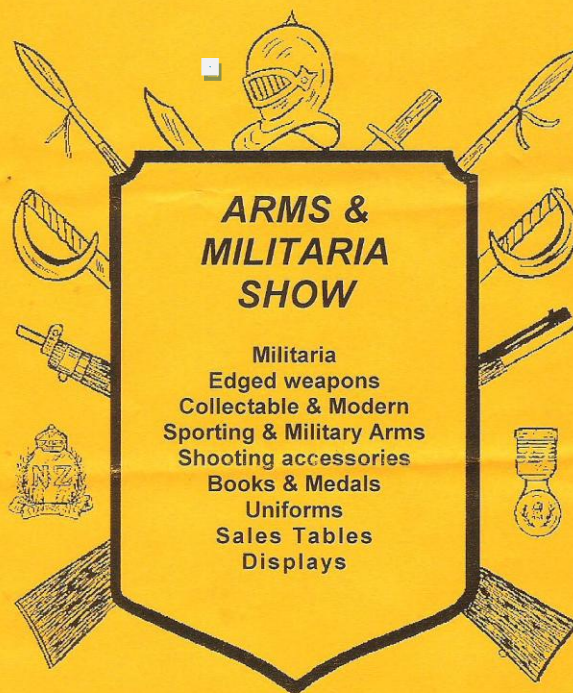
