EDITORIAL

With four members of the OAS shot in a single incident, (I wonder how that happened), a large seizure of firearms in another drug raid and a street shooting in South Auckland all in one week resulted in a storm of anti gun mania in the national press and media this past month. The pressure on the politicians was such that the Minister of Police bowed to the call for a Select Committee Enquiry into firearms in the hands of criminals. When I met her recently she assured me that was the only aim of the enquiry.

We already know that police are preparing an Arms Amendment Bill, as yet they wont tell us what they are proposing, but you can bet that put together with the Enquiry it will give the anti firearm lobby and the police hierarchy an opportunity to introduce further restrictions on our hobby.

Both SSANZ and COLFO have been proactive in seeking data, by way of Official Information Act Requests to Police, to counter arguments put forward calling for further restriction on law abiding firearm owners.

Will you be ready to stand up and be counted when the time comes? Remember both SSANZ and COLFO only have one voice, but if all our individual members voice their views too we can have a big impact on the decision makers.

AN INTERESTING PLACE TO VISIT

Driving South on the Waikato Express Way, about a kilometre past Mercer is the site of Whangamarino Redoubt. Turn left into Oram Road, cross the railway and park by the weir on the Whangamarino River, from here it is a 10-15 minute walk to Te Teoteo's Pa and redoubt. I will let the signage tell the story.



Whangamarino Redoubt Historic Reserve

These ditches and banks are the remains of a redoubt-stockade built by British troops of the 14th Regiment. After the battle of Koheroa on 17th July 1863, General Cameron's Imperial & Colonial forces, occupied nearby TeTeoteo Pa and selected this site. The position was completed by 22 September 1863 and was used as a forward position for 150 troops. In late October 1863, two 40 pounder Armstrong seige guns were set up here to bombard Meremere Pa two kilometres to the south.

The position was defended by a ditch and bank on the south and east sides. Locally cut timber and materials salvaged from Te Teoteo Pā, were used to build the north and west walls which were up to 6 metres high and 600mm thick, to protect from elevated fire.

As you stand on this spot and look through the view-shaft, imagine the intensity of the British fire from this hillside. The only significant difference in the view is that, in 1863, there were extensive swamplands, lakes and forest between the Whangamarino ridge and the Meremere knoll, 3-4 kilometres to the south.



Such a gun of a show

IT was promoted as a gun show, but was so much more.

The Otorohanga Club became an historical military depot on February 28 with 450 amateur historians, each with their own passion for keeping alive the memories of those who sacrificed their lives in wartime.

Members of the Antique and Historical Arms Association mounted 20 displays of collectors' treasures, memories and memorabilia from conflicts dating from the New Zealand Land Wars and throughout the past century.

With ANZAC Day on the horizon and current World War I centenary events, there was a focus on The Great War (1914-18).

Collectors from Whangarei to Wellington came to see intricate displays of guns, ammunition, uniforms, models, medals, books and weaponry, some of which was on sale.

A military vehicle collector parked his personnel carrier and Army truck, while World War II Historical Re-enactment Society members in full uniform stood guard in a sand-bagged defensive position at the main entrance.

"Members are really amateur historians with a huge knowledge of what they collect," says Kath Arnold, secretary of the central branch which hosted the annual show.

Mrs Arnold collects Marlin lever-action rifles used to shoot buffalos and other game in the American west.

"People love to hear the stories that come with individual pieces of military memorabilia," she says.

"There were weapons from France, Germany, England, New Zealand... even the American Civil War. The people's choice winner was a wonderful display of WWI saddlery, harness and gear used by the New Zealand Mounted Rifles Brigade."

OTO COLLECTOR

Otorohanga collector of die-cast military models Leo Parkes showed

some of his 100 mainly matchbox-sized WWII trucks, aircraft, tanks and jeeps.

Mr Parkes has collected military models for more than 50 years and has originals dating back to the vintage British Lesney matchbox models of the 1950s and '60s.

"I got into it after seeing them at car shows and swap meets and buying up as many as I could afford," he says.

CIVIL WAR MEMORABILIA

John Hart, also of Otorohanga, displayed his American Civil War memorabilia from 1861-65 which included guns, cap boxes, ammunition boxes, a rare Confederate sword, a copy of an infantry sergeant's uniform and a battlefield relics such as buttons, projectiles and badges.

He also collects American-Indian War (1860-90s) relics and owns a cap and ball revolver made in 1863 and a Colt revolver issued to the 7th Cavalry for the Battle of Little Big Horn.

Phil Creegen from Whangarei, who collects British and Commonwealth military firearms, was greatly impressed by the Otorohanga show.

He's been interested in firearms for about 60 years and says the hobby is "huge" in NZ.

"People often get started after hearing their father's or grandfather's war stories about their service in the Army, Navy or Air Force," says Mr Creegen.

"That gets them interested in military history, so they want to find out about Gallipoli or wherever their grandfather served."

The Grim Reaper by Andrew Edgcombe

German WWI MG08 Maxim Machine Gun Manufactured by DWM Berlin, 1916, 7.92mm water cooled with water jacket amour for trench warfare, rate of fire 550 rounds per minute. Total DWM production was in the vicinity of 54000 guns, dubbed the “Grim Reaper” or “The Devils Paintbrush” due to its ability to paint the landscape red.

Germany's Military enthusiastically embraced the machine gun for tactical use and the MG08 was widely distributed on all fronts throughout the First World War. Germany was well ahead of the Allied forces in the widespread deployment of Machine Guns and specialized crews. These guns were responsible for the deaths of hundreds of thousands of Allied Soldiers and the guns and crews were deemed priority targets, when captured the guns were considered a highly prized trophy.

This Gun exhibits battle scars in the form of a large gash through the underside of the water jacket caused by shrapnel, mute testament to time spent in heavy combat conditions. At the cessation of hostilities in 1918 New Zealand was allocated some 1600 Captured machine Guns as Official War Trophy's, most were NZ captured guns. These guns were distributed throughout the Colony for display at schools, councils and community organizations. Most of these guns are now gone, dumped or scraped long ago.



BOOK RELEASE

The Lady from Flanders Fields honours the New Zealand soldiers.

Everyone has been touched by the losses of WWI with its many battles.

The book from Belgian and former judge D. Cooreman describes the La Basse-Ville Operation (mid June until end August 1917) in Belgium. It is probably unique that in this battle only Māori and Pākehā were involved.

This book pictures different aspects of the operation and more personal stories of individual soldiers. Their stories emphasises the horror of it all.

The launch of the book takes place **21st of April 2016 at 5.30pm at the Settlers Museum, after visiting the Memorial Clock at the Main Street both in Waipawa (Central Hawke's Bay).**

Many descendants, Māori and Pākehā, will come from all over New Zealand to pay tribute to their forebears and share and show the medals and memorabilia their fathers and uncles have left them.

No doubt this will be a huge event.

The author has been done thorough research everywhere the 'boys' went: Cairo, Alexandria, Gallipoli, Hobart, France... and all the places they were from in New Zealand. The last 12 years she spend commuting between New Zealand and Belgium to gather all the information and fill in the puzzles, putting the men in their original context too. It is a story about 100 years ago that is still relevant today.

'A noted lawyer and judge in Belgium, Dominique wrote this book as a tribute to the New Zealanders who fought in Belgium in the First World War. She has taken her forensic skills and has carried out remarkably detailed research that encompasses more than just the individual soldiers who fought there. It is a story of New Zealanders but one seen through the eyes of a trained mind from a different culture, a world away.

Her investigation examines what it means to be a New Zealander. It not only embraces the events of La Basse-Ville and of a Maori sergeant, but also expands like the tentacles of an octopus, telling the story of the town, its history and how it was absorbed into the two neighbouring towns and is now forgotten. In the same way her story of Charles Sciascia and others examines not only how they came to join the New Zealand Division and their role in the fighting, but also that of their family and friends and the impact of war on these families and the wider community.

This is done in turn for all of the New Zealanders that she meets in her research. Each chapter becomes not only the story of a person but also a personal journey for Dominique herself. It is her own journey to New Zealand and in meeting and talking to the soldiers' descendants; she takes us on a voyage of discovery, rich in history and insight. This book is a labour of love from an author who loves her country but is also entranced by these men who came from the 'uttermost ends of the earth' to fight and die in Belgium. Nothing is left out: the book delves into the lives of the New Zealanders who fought at la Basse-Ville from 1917 to the present day – almost a century later.'

The book itself defies categorisation. It is part travelogue, part-history. It reflects on the nature of war and its impact on two different societies a world apart: New Zealand and Belgium. It will both overwhelm and entrance you.

It is the story of Dominique Cooreman's love affair with New Zealand and New Zealanders and we are the richer for it.'

Research on the British and colonial forces in Napier 1866 - Request for information.

I am looking for information on 12th (East Suffolk) Regiment of Foot ('The Old Dozen') - 1st Battalion who were in Napier and Waipawa at the time of the Battles for Napier (fought at Omarunui and Petane) on 12 October 1866), also information on the NZ Colonial Forces in HB being the Colonial Defence Force Cavalry and the HB Military Settlers and details of their fort at Clive all established in 1863.

In October 1863 Hawkes Bay's Maori population was about 3600, and the European population about 2600.

I am also seeking information on the Napier Volunteer Rifles and the HB Militia units No1 Napier and No2 Napier, No3 who drilled at Clive and No 4 who drilled at Puketapu and Petane all were established in 1863

Photos, drawings, images of uniforms and arms, medals and personal stories of life in the military forces in Napier / HB at that time.

Under the NZ Militia Act of 1865 it was compulsory for all able bodied pakeha males between the ages of 18 and 55 years to enlist in the Militia or Volunteers unless there was a special reason.

In 1866 Napier had a population of about 1300, of which 800 were women and children.


