EDITORIAL

Police Minister Paula Bennett has delivered the government response to the Select Committee Inquiry report into the illegal possession of firearms by criminals. It is pleasing to note that the minister has largely rejected all those recommendations that firearm owners opposed. This is thanks to all of you who communicated your views to the minister and her advisors.

In addition to the 8 recommendations she has accepted she has introduced two new recommendations which are seen as beneficial: 1. to give the Police power to suspend a licence rather than revoke it, allowing the problem to be resolved more quickly and 2. To require Police to consult more with the firearm community.

Remember before any of the recommendations become law there will be a further round of consultation as any new Bill proceeds through the Select Committee stage.

It is unlikely that anything will happen until after the September election, but then there could be a change in government and then all bets are off and we could be back to square one.

TURNING THE TIDE

COLFO congratulates firearms users for being vocal on recent firearms issues. This is a good start to what will end up being a long campaign.

Over the past year firearm owners have felt as though their sport, hobby or lifestyle was under serious threat from changing policies introduced by New Zealand Police. Our media have been fed propaganda by the Police Association for tougher gun control which when printed has sent alarm throughout the ill-informed public and non-firearms using communities. The Police Association's consistent misinformation has resulted in the firearms community being demonised when they are in fact vetted to be some of the most responsible, law abiding citizens in this country.

We all hoped that the Select Committee Inquiry into how criminals arm themselves with firearms would report a fair and just way forward so that we could battle the issues hand in hand with our Police and Government. What the Committee's report showed us is that Police appear hell bent on curbing the civilian use and ownership of firearms, that we fit and proper owners are no better than criminals and our Government were supportive of these attitudes. With your voices of concern and reasoning being expressed loud and strong you have changed the tide and thinking of our Members of Parliament. It appears however that there is no change of tide within the New Zealand Police.

The publication of the 2017 Arms Code with the printed requirement to "justify" the number of firearms you own is just one example of Police high handed behaviour. When media asked Police about the vetters that are already threatening consequences of not obliging their "justification" requests the response was disappointing. Instead of looking to rectify a vetter's wrongful demands Police merely said they hadn't been told about it. Just as they appear not to have been told about the "draft" code being printed thousands of times and distributed at their direction and at tax payers expense.

YOU MADE THIS HAPPEN

The combined efforts of the many members of COLFOs various associated organisations, individual members, like-minded pro-firearm users mobilised through social media networks, forums, blogs and emails made this happen. You voiced concerns to Ministers, their advisors, other politicians, the Police commissioner and the media. Because of this we are having an effect. We are now being listened to.

Our plight has reached overseas agencies who are watching and reporting to their memberships what is happening here. The NRA-ILA and Australian shooting fraternities to name two. Correlations between actions taken in Australia, Britain and Canada are also being published. There are media that are now questioning some of what the Police Association say before they publish it. There are Government Ministers asking for input and ideas from us before responding to arms issues.

FIREARMS COMMUNITY ADVISORY FORUM

Those that belong to organisations that are represented on the Firearms Community Advisory Forum (FCAF) may have recently doubted the effect of the forum. COLFO also sits on the forum and can tell you that those representatives are doing the best they can with the little information they are given by NZ Police. Your representatives cannot argue or make comment on situations that they are not made aware of while sitting around a table. It's been mentioned to Police hierarchy that us having to advise them about a change of policy after a complaint shows a lack of transparency at our meetings. It is not the ideal way forward and we resent being treated this way.

The current group of FCAF representatives are certainly outspoken and passionate advocates for your sports. It is important that you continue to back your representatives so that the forum maintains its strength and integrity as a whole group while at times being dealt a backhand.

FCAF members and NZ Police have discussed this lack of transparency and Police are now making a conscious effort to communicate and hear advice from the firearms community. A virtue that was a given in (retired) Inspector Joe Green's time but immediately lost upon his departure.

The Forum has recently seconded two sub-committees with Police. One is to address future security requirements and the other was to address Police response to the Law & Order Select Committee's recommendations.

WHAT ABOUT EVERYONE ELSE?

COLFO and the FCAF representatives speak on behalf of a good number of firearms licensed users. Encompassing nearly all that are in some sort of shooting organisation. But there are still tens of thousands of users that are not in a club or organisation. We need them to hear the messages for a call to action when they are heralded. We need your help to spread our messages. Social media works well and reaches tens of thousands of people in a short time frame. COLFO has successfully worked with Facebook firearms advocates FOUNZ to keep users informed. It helps us if you share our posts and encourage others to sign up to our social media page for up to date information. COLFO also publishes these bi-monthly newsletters which are printed by NZ Guns & Hunting, placed on our website and circulated to our member organisations.

WHAT IS COLFO DOING?

We are constantly lobbying members of parliament. We are in the ears and in front of the faces of important people that are a part of some important decision-making processes. Our chairman Paul Clark meets frequently with members of our Government. One of our Board members Nicole McKee was appointed as one of two independent advisors to the Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Police Paula Bennett. Fellow advisor Geoff Thomas and Nicole's role was to comment on the Police report to the Select Committee's Recommendations. Nicole tells us their comprehensive and detailed report to the Minister was supported by the huge feedback they received from the firearms community. Most of which reinforced her personal views and gave the advisors examples that they could write about. Nicole would like to thank all those that took the time to write in. Your emails made a huge difference to how the advisor's report was presented.

WHERE TO NOW?

It's election year. Our Members of Parliament are out lobbying and want your vote. We have reminded those prospective parliamentarians that there are 242,000 law abiding, fit and proper, eligible to vote firearms owners out there and we haven't counted their families yet. We will continue to lobby government on your behalf and we would like you to continue to do the same. Visit our COLFO website where you can select an email topic, amend or add to the content and send it to all current Members of Parliament.

After the Minister of Police Paula Bennett has released the Government's response to the Law & Order Select Committee's report we expect things may go quiet for a short time. It may even stay quiet until after the election. COLFO would like to rally as many people as possible to get on board with us during this time in preparation for the discussions and prospective Arms Amendment Bill that may lie ahead. If you like what we are doing then come and join us and bring a mate with you. When talking law changes, there is power in numbers especially when those numbers are voters.

Intelligent Collector: Thwarting Thievery By Danielle Arnet. Contributed by Grant Soich

PAPERWORK HELPS PROTECT YOUR TREASURES FROM LOSS

THERE IS ONE sure thing guaranteed to strike terror in the heart of a serious collector, and it is the idea that a beloved item may be lost, or even worse, swindled away. The mere possibility will send any collector into absolute shock.

No one wants to think that anything untoward or larcenous might happen to their precious and lovingly gathered collection or inheritance. Certainly, not after they hand it over in good faith to be sold.

Yet for the unwary and unprepared, deceit is a real possibility. One notable episode still unspooling as we write involves multiple lawsuits against a New York art dealer accused of pocketing proceeds of works entrusted to him by clients. The case involves pieces by Picasso, Canaletto, Magritte, Chagall, Gauguin and van Gogh. In some instances, this dealer was not even authorized to sell the works.

Assets amounting to more than \$10 million have been frozen while courts in the United Kingdom and United States unravel charges levelled by individuals and family trusts. In at least one case, dealers who received works without clear title from the accused dealer have also been sued.

The accused dealer's actions and the resultant flap are not unique, nor is the precipitating motive. Larceny often happens because a high-flying dealer/advisor gets into a financial bind, then uses available merchandise as a way of climbing from the hole.

Within the past decade, the long arm of the law has reached out to touch the former board president of a prestigious American museum, plus a museum curator who acted with a family member to allegedly pocket client monies. And there are more. Not all were crimes against individuals; some were against trusts and institutions.

All sorts of flimflams are possible after you release a valuable item to what you believe is a trusted gallery or dealer. Make sure you do your due diligence. In most cases, experts say, chicanery is easily preventable.

BEYOND A HANDSHAKE "Many major art deals happen on a handshake and a promise, and that comes from a tradition in the art world," says Mark Prendergast, Heritage Auctions' director of trusts and estates. A handshake deal does not have legal documentation to support it and often does not serve the consignor well.

Pennsylvania-based expert Robert Wittman has seen the seamy side of art fraud. Formerly a special agent for the FBI who investigated art theft and fraud, he worked undercover throughout the world to recover stolen property. After 20 years with the bureau, Wittman became an art security consultant. "There are things any good collector should do, whether they are selling their goods or not," says Wittman, author of the book *Priceless: How I Went Undercover to Rescue the World's Stolen Treasures*.

Always collect paperwork, he advises. Intelligent collectors save receipts from purchases and make notes on provenance, condition and pertinent dates. And they keep them current. As years pass, be sure to note any new information. Also track market results or changes related to the piece.

Keep a dossier on every item. When the time comes to sell, you'll have valuable facts at hand.

As Prendergast puts it, "You have to make informed decisions so that you can form expectations on selling when the time comes."

When the day to let the item or collection go arrives, review those dossiers. Then examine every contract offered. Ask questions if you do not understand something. Solid contracts make for fewer issues throughout the sale process.

Going further, Prendergast advises to include wording on what-if contingencies, such as limiting time in a consignment agreement. As an example, insert language stating that the dealer may hold the property a specific time before selling. That ensures that your treasure cannot languish in a dusty corner for just the "right" sale. Selling through a major auction house defines the sale period and ensures the timeline for possible sale.

Contract language can include contingency for a slow payer or what happens if the item does not sell. If the seller will list the item again, language is needed on how long he or she can hold an item before trying again.

"Paperwork is the key," Prendergast emphasizes. Without proper forethought, "Financial issues start snowballing." Yes, prep can be tedious. But regrets last forever.

He summed it up this way: "If you're selling real estate, would you simply hand it over to a real estate agent?" Anyone who has ploughed through multi-page selling agreements for land or a house will get the point.

DEACTIVATED LINE TROWING FLARE GUN FROM THE UK By Lex Severinson

I didn't really know what UK "deactivation" meant when I bought this harmless Schermuly Line Thrower pistol, on the internet.

Here's two guns, side by side for comparison, showing the damage;



Slot cut in bottom of barrel. Barrel plugged. Ejector damaged.
Military proof marks ground off. Firing pin ground off. Gouged breech face.

And did it end up cheaper than NZ? Nah,... so many extra costs, it cost about double what I thought!

So before you're tempted to buy a gun on the internet, be sure to figure your extra costs, on top of Hammer price, such as...

Buyers Premium.... up to **28%**

Credit Card fees.... **3%**

VAT or local tax; sometimes on both hammer price and premium.... Up to **10%**.

You can avoid this if exported immediately. But you'll need permits to import, and sometimes to export. Import permits can take 2-3 months, so you need to get them early, or you'll need storage.

Packaging and shipping a small pistol to storage facility... About **\$US 70**.

Storage.... **\$US 3/day** if not arranged.

Export Permit (USA)... Up to **\$US 250**.

Antiquities certificate (Europe)... **120 Euros**.

Federal Firearms charges if gun is younger than 1898 in USA.... **\$US 110**.

Packaging and shipping to NZ...about **\$US 260** for 2 pistols, **\$US 1000** for a Brown Bess.

Foreign exchange conversion fees... **3%**.

Customs fees... **\$NZ 20**. GST on total costs... **15%**

POLIC ANNOUNCE A NEW DEPARTMENT TO HANDLE THE ARMS ACT ADMINISTRATION

This message received 14 June 2017

Good afternoon FCAF members

Today, the Government released its response to the Law and Order Select Committee's Report on issues relating to the illegal possession of firearms. For those of you that may not already have seen the response, I have attached a copy to this email.

The purpose of my email is to also advise you of the steps the Police Executive is taking to deliver stronger consultative and decision-making processes relating to our administration of the Arms Act.

We acknowledge there has been frustration and some concern relating to administration of the Arms Act, and that we need to be more responsive in consulting with the Forum and the wider firearms community.

The Police Executive recognises this concern, and is taking action in response. As you will be aware, in 2016 we established the Firearms Safety and Control Project to identify opportunities for improvement, but recognise that we need to move more quickly. As a result, we have introduced a new governance structure that provides greater oversight and direction of firearms related matters.

I'm pleased to advise that a new Arms Act Service Delivery Group, incorporating the Arms Control Unit and the Arms Safety Control Project is in the process of being established to lead this work. This new Group will report directly to the Police Executive and be focused on improving administrative efficiency and strengthening communications and consultative processes. It will take some time to get this group fully functioning. Until then, I welcome any questions, comments or suggestions you may have either directly through the email to projectfirearms@police.govt.nz or through FCAF. This will help build our appreciation of any issues as they arise.

In the interim the work already in progress will continue. We will continue to consult with the Forum as an important conduit between Police and the firearms community.

To further support the emphasis and priority Police is giving to this work, I'm pleased to welcome Acting Superintendent Mike McIlraith, who has been appointed to lead the group and will report directly to me, the Deputy Commissioner National Operations.

Mike brings a broad range of experience from his 25-year career with New Zealand Police, and a 20-year career with the New Zealand Army (Territorial Force), which has included service in Afghanistan and East Timor respectively, and in recent senior Police leadership roles in prevention, response, training and national project delivery.

To that end, Acting Supt. McIlraith will be making contact soon to meet Forum members and talk through these changes. He will be seeking your feedback on how we can keep you better informed and involved as we move forward.


William Whiting and the Webley company had high hopes for their self-loading pistols being adopted by the British military - but they never got the success they were hoping for.

After the poor performance of the Webley 1904 at trials, William Whiting decided to make sure his next attempt would be fully developed before he put it in the hands of the military. He did very well at that too, as the gun which would become the Model 1913 Webley did very well from its very first military tests. The Royal Navy was, in fact, quite enthusiastic about it, although the Army was not. The Navy would ultimately adopt the gun and purchase about 8,000 of them during World War One, while the Army acquired just a couple hundred and preferred to stick to its revolvers. New Zealand on the Western Front 1917: The Battle of Messines from the National Army Museum June Newsletter



At 3.10am on 7th June 1917, a series of underground mines laid by Allied tunnellers exploded under German-held territory near the Belgian village of Messines. Just moments after the thunderous blast and backed by a heavy artillery barrage, New Zealand troops alongside Australian and British forces began advancing across no-man's land to capture their objective, Messines Ridge.

Compared to the misfortunes of the Somme in 1916 and the tragedies that were to come at Passchendaele, the Battle of Messines was a relative success for the Allies. Yet, the ground gained was not achieved without considerable losses for the NZ units involved. Withdrawn from the line two days later, the New Zealanders had suffered 3700 casualties during the offensive, 700 of which were fatal.

RUSSIAN AK 12 Contributed by Dave Craze

A video showing the Russian army's future assault rifle has appeared online sparking the interest of military analysts and firearms enthusiasts. The Kalashnikov AK-12, the newest derivative of the Soviet/Russian AK-pattern series of assault rifles, has been under development since 2011. It is designed to be the weapon of the Russian soldiers of tomorrow under the Ratnik (Warrior) future infantry combat system which allows Vladimir Putin's troops to take advantage of the very latest technology.

Creators of the AK-12 say it has undergone a host of modifications after the Russian Ministry of Defence at one stage said it would not be buying the gun.

It reportedly had a series of design defects but designers say these have all now been overcome and the weapon has been fully tested in the field.


The latest version of the AK-12, unveiled at the Army-2016 military exhibition last autumn, can take a magazine of up to 30 bullets and can be used with a tripod (*I think they mean bi-pod, Ed*) for shooting from the ground. The changes and improvements of the latest model, based on the tried and tested AK-400, have reportedly increased the weapon's service life, reliability and accuracy.

Among the gun's main features are its improved ergonomics compared to previous models such as the AKM, AK-74 and AK-74M. The new AK-12 also has less recoil, an improved cooling system, is lighter and shorter, and is easier to use in combat as it can be loaded with just one hand.

It is reported that the AK-12 will be used as part of the Ratnik program which is designed to improve the connectivity and combat effectiveness of Russian combat personnel.

No one provided the correct answer for last month's mystery object which was provided by Mike Carrick, who had this to say about it:

It was designed for the 300,000 Model 1895 Winchester lever-action rifles cal. 7.62R mm ordered by the Imperial Russian

Government for WW1. The Model 1895 Winchester is a difficult rifle to field strip, and its small combination tool is quite complex. This tool was designed by Albert Laudensack at Winchester who was an ordnance engineer employed by Winchester and was one of the best rifle shots in the country. Laudensack is the same man who designed the clip guides fastened to the side of the receiver to enable loading the magazine from the 5-shot stripper clip.

The tool has three punches and one removable retainer pin for reassembly of the carrier and magazine. It holds the related parts in the correct position until the carrier screw can be inserted. This retainer pin is shown at the tip of the tool in the 12 o'clock position. The uses of the two notches on the centre leg of the tool are as compression clamps. The notch on the left side of the centre leg will compress the split pin of the finger lever when the left-hand leg of the tool is squeezed against it, and the notch on the right-hand leg will compress the finger-lever link-pin when the right-hand two legs are squeezed together.

The L1A1's with Brass Butt Discs were RNZAF Weapons. It should have the unit and rack number stamped on it.


