NZAR ID A38 **Batons of Police in New Zealand 1840–1900** Compiled by John Osborne DTT, PhD, FSG March 2011 In the Victorian era, British Police carried truncheons or batons about one-foot long. The truncheon acted as the Policeman's 'Warrant Card' as the Royal Crest attached to it indicated the Policeman's authority.

Policing in New Zealand started in 1840 with the arrival of the New South Wales Mounted Police (similar to the Royal Irish Constabulary) accompanying Lt. Governor Hobson during the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi. Many of New Zealand's first police were ex military and /or had served in Ireland or Australia


